HOTEL RESERVATIONS

Yes, we are having some communication and technical issues with the hotel process. Sharon and I will be meeting with the Hotel Management Team, on Tuesday, December 4th, to resolve some issues to make your reservation process a positive experience. Just be assured according to our signed contract: Our Group Name is Sisters For Christian Community, we do have a guarantee of 3 days prior and 3 days after our Assembly to be able to extend our reservation at the same \$129 Assembly Rate, and we always have the ability to increase the number of rooms (which we will also be doing during our meeting with the management Team).

ASSEMBLY MEALS

During the Assembly, we will be providing 2 meals per day through the Hotel: Breakfast and early Supper which will be our main meal. The main reason for this is that we are being charged 48% service fee (excluding the tip) for every dollar of food spend. No one will go hungry. We do have options: 1) Among ourselves, thanks to Deb Murphy, we will be using her room as our Hospitality Room which will have a variety of healthy and savory foods; 2) Place an outside for food to be picked up or delivered; 3) For those who prefer something else, the Hotel Café is available to purchase food. These other options will be addressed each day at the Assembly. These options are most cost effective and a better

use of your Assembly Fee. YES, our COMMITMENT /JUBILEE SERVICE will be celebrated during our early supper time.

THEME

In the words of John Dear, "We're called to practice nonviolence toward ourselves, toward every human, towards all creatures and Mother Earth, and to join and help build up the global grassroots nonviolence movement." Lilian Ehidiamhen SFCC, will be presenting "Becoming One With The Divine Through Integrating Nonviolence". It was seeking out to live passionately the Gospel Value of Nonviolence, in our SFCC Profile, that touched the heart of Lilian and drew her to our community.

Lilian's presentation "will focus on reminding ourselves the need to pay more attention to nonviolent communication in the way we connect with ourselves and others to enable us to be our best and give our best For Christian Community and for the world. Nonviolent communication is based on the idea that human beings are motivated by needs and the manner we communicate our needs to ourselves and others through actions and language. People get into conflict when their needs are not met. When we use violent strategies to meet our needs, it could lead to disconnection, conflict, and creation of enemy images. Nonviolent communication provides us with a skillset which we can embody and apply in the way we communicate our needs to ourselves and others.

Additionally, the Catholic Church is paying more attention to prioritizing nonviolence as a means of resolving conflicts and improving human relationships. How are we the SFCC's contributing to this mission through our charism and profile of nonviolence? To enable us live our nonviolent profile, I will discuss the relevance of nonviolent communication which has the potential to support us to embody nonviolence and give the best For Christian Community and for our world."

EVALUATOR REPORT



The Evaluator's Report from the Collegial Process at Assembly 2023 in Kenya was inadvertently omitted from the October ATA. The observations that Pat Mitchell makes in her report

are important for future assemblies.

COLLEGIAL PROCESS EVALUATOR'S REPORT

The Role of the Evaluator is to assess the general session that has just ended according to our nine-step collegial decision-making process.

Evaluation of the Process:

Roberta Kardell provided a good review of the consensus process as we moved through each step.

Clarification Sessions: During the first clarification session Assembly participants, both those participating in person and those participating virtually, asked good, clear questions in order to understand the proposals/recommendations. Something we might want to keep in mind going forward is that, with new members joining the community each year, it is important for us to provide the context or background of the various topics being discussed. Even if this has been done at the regional level, new information often needs to be repeated multiple times before it is absorbed. There were a few times when things got off topic, commenting

on what someone else had just said or introducing additional topics rather than asking clarifying questions.

During the open mic session when members expressed their perspective about the proposal/recommendation being discussed, it was good to see a few of our sisters from other countries express their views. It is worth noting, though, that most of those who spoke were members from the United States. For many in attendance, this was their first International Assembly experience and, as a result, it was a crash course on how our collegial decision-making process works. To all our sisters living around the globe: your voice matters, we need and value your input. We look forward to hearing more of your voices at future assemblies!

Consensus process: It was encouraging to see some of our sisters from around the globe take on the role of recorder/reporter, including some of our Affiliates. The consensus process went well, with some sisters being willing to step aside or change their point of view during the table discussions.

Because this was the first Assembly for many of those participating in person, additional clarifying questions came up at the table discussions during the consensus process. With so many new members joining the community each year, helping our newest members and Affiliates come to Assembly 1) understanding the steps in the collegial decision-making process and 2) coming prepared with clarifying questions from their region might be helpful.

General observations:

Last year, thanks in large part to Mary Rose Accetturo and Bernadette Mendez, the hybrid format went very well, allowing those who were unable to attend in person to actively participate virtually. Unfortunately, this year there were significant technical issues that greatly impacted the flow of the Assembly. Going forward it will be very important to identify Assembly locations where the technology (Wi-Fi, microphones, etc.) is very dependable since hybrid Assemblies are the best way to allow the greatest number of sisters to participate.

Some of the proposals/recommendations were interconnected. Something to consider going forward in a similar situation might be for regions to reach out to the Clarifiers as soon as this is identified to suggest that they connect with each other to see if there is a way to submit one proposal /recommendation that would be agreeable to both. One of the recommendations contained multiple recommendations, which made it challenging to know how to discuss it. This is another area where regions could reach out to the Clarifier to request that the recommendation/proposal be narrowed down to one topic.

There was a suggested change in schedule on Thursday that would have prohibited many of our sisters from participating virtually. Those participating in person made it clear that they wanted to keep the schedule as it was originally set so that those participating virtually could be included. This demonstrated our commitment to our charism – and this year's Assembly theme - "That All May Be One."



What follows are summary thoughts from our discussion: The synod aims at generating a true sense of equality among all people both within and outside the Church. The problem, of course, rests with the hierarchy's mentality of being an elite branch of the Church. To work around that, we, as SFCC must strive to be daily witnesses to equality and respect by our presence to all whom we encounter, as well as to fully listen to those who voice their hopes and concerns. As SFCC we must provide example of shifting away from dependency on the hierarchy towards reliance on ourselves and one another.

We understood that the greatest gift of hope we have to offer is our ability to listen with open minds and hearts to the burdens of others. Our attitude of listening is directly connected by our vow of obedience/listening.

We also focused on the synod's goal that we must expose evil by acting in the opposite manner. We must be compassionate without judgement because this is not only the hope of the synod, but also the challenge of our vow of celibacy/loving. Following the discussion was the discernment session for Lorena Baron's affirmation. Lorena will be virtually affirmed via zoom. Later in February, she will meet in person with Virgie and Nona when they are both in Manila. At that time, there will be an in-person ceremony.

Nineteen sisters joined the WEB Zoom on Saturday, October 14, 2023. Maggie told of her recent ministry spending two days with the transgender community and the similarity between their experiences and that of women in India. Roberta talked about the protests in Guatemala that are creating blockades into and out of the city. The protests are against the current government's efforts to disqualify the newly elected president who is to take office next January. Patti asked for prayer for her community in El Salvador who suffer from the gang activity.

Because of our increasing global growth

there was consideration given to submitting a recommendation to separate the ATA subscription from the Service role fees. With an ICC team that is now international, ensuring that they can gather yearly at the assembly will require additional funds to provide air fare, thus the importance of stressing payment of the service role fees which may have to be increased in the future. Some felt that everyone should contribute in paying for the ATA, including the \$10 currently paid by the digital subscribers. Currently, it is the sisters in N.A. and Europe who are paying the \$10. Many of our sisters in Africa and Philippines, who receive the ATA digitally, cannot afford the extra U.S. dollars. Separating the fees would emphasize support of the service roles that is our commitment as members of SFCC. Because the internet is unreliable in many places outside the U.S., accessing the ATA on the SFCC website is not a workable option. The digital copies should continue to be sent via email

where it can be read on the phone. RCCs should take responsibility for sisters in their region who are in facilities and/or are unable to access the ATA. It can be printed from the digital copy.

On Saturday, November 11 fifteen sisters again gathered via Zoom. After prayer that addressed Pope Francis' plea for peace in the Holy Land and throughout the world, we reviewed the recommendation to be submitted to the December ATA. It was suggested that, in order to facilitate international payments, the community subscribe to a PayPal account and that forms be such that they can be filled out and sent digitally.

In the remainder of our time together we shared thoughts on the segment of the Synodal Synthesis: *On the Road to Christian Unity.* The question arose that the document only addressed Christian denominations connected through baptism. What about Muslims, Jews, Hindus, etc.? Focusing on

baptism as a criterion for ecumenical dialogue puts another obstacle in the way of unity. If Jesus, his life and message is the central focus, then love will be the focus more than baptism. Mention was made about *The Pact of the Catacombs* signed by more than 500 bishops during and after Vatican II. It was also signed by some bishops at the Synod. Some sisters had no knowledge of it so a copy of the document was sent to the region after the meeting. Also suggested was the *Book of Joy* by Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama and the YouTube segment for reading and viewing. The



Synod document recommending further study and more ecumenical involvement raises hope that "all may be one".

RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation #1 We recommend, with modification from the assembly floor, if any, that the form for the Service Role Fees be separated from the Subscription for the ATA.

Rationale: Currently, the only sisters paying the service role fee of \$15 per year are sisters who send in the subscription form for the ATA. The ICC report in July 2023 indicated 337 affirmed sisters. The ATA report in July 2023 indicated 136 subscriptions which means 200 sisters are not contributing to support the service roles. The sisters in the West (N.A. and Europe), whose numbers are diminishing, provide the most contributions.

Recommendation #2 IF THE SUBSCRIPTION FORM AND SERVICE ROLE FEE FORMS ARE SEPARATED, we recommend that sisters who receive the paper copy of the ATA support the printing and mailing of those copies by sending the Subscription Form published in the October issue. All sisters who submit an email address with the Service Fee Form receive the ATA digitally. Both forms would continue to include the current options:

Unable to pay all or part of the fee but wish to receive the ATA.

Additional donation to ATA or Service Role Fee
