
A NEW REGION IS BORN!

Lydia Plastas will serve as RCC for a period of three years. Our next meeting is scheduled for August 12th and 13th.

We shared a delicious meal together and adjourned our meeting at 4pm happy with our decision to form this new region.





DAM REGION & SPAIN

The **Dam and Spain regions** met April 22 both in person and via Zoom. Suzanne



Dunn, Jeannette Love, and Rose Miles gathered with Pat Mullen in Pat's home in Phoenix, Arizona. Magda, Fran, Pat Mitchell and Carmen participated through Zoom.

Using two 4 minute videos, Jeannette led us in a listening prayer: through the sound of the breeze, birds and water we contemplated our relation with God through nature.

Suzanne facilitated our spiritual reading reflection/discussion on the 2nd half of *Church of the Wild* (Victoria Loorz) to explore the ways wilderness (nature) and the Holy are connected for each of us. We reflected on our place among all earthly creation, as well as the universe and agreed we needed to be present as a "verb" (in dialog) rather than as a "noun" (dominative and exploitative). Our next shared spiritual reading is *Beyond the Pandemic: Spiritual and Ecological Challenges* (Diramuid O'Murchu)

Our social justice session proved to be inspiring and energizing as we each shared some good news happening in the world. We learned about Women Inspirit, Inc., an organization that focuses on education of young marginalized women in developing nations (Pat Mullen). The Technical Institute trade school operated by Marta Nyaga, SFCC (Kenya) that enables young adults in rural Kenya to earn trade certification (Fran), Suzanne introduced us to *The Optimist Newsletter* that arrives daily via email bringing a variety of positive news to start your day. Pat Mitchell reported about the rehabilitation of the natural food source for manatees in Florida. We learned from Jeannette about Anita Chitaya, a farmer in Malwai who provides practical solutions to irreversible damage created by climate change to the land and her village. **Rose** closed our session with 2 videos

demonstrating the success of vertical farming and vertical harvesting taking place in the US and Netherlands. Vertical farming is understood to be the most effective answer to the massive erosion and crop destruction resulting from the aggressive weather generated by climate change.

We discussed the several community business items that appeared in the recent ATA:

Website Request for Special Funds: we lend our voice to approve these funds because the website is a primary tool of communication, a hub of information both for SFCC members and persons wanting to know more about us. Updated, the site can be used effectively during International Assembly and the place of interregional communication throughout the year.

Florida Region: (1) designate a central communication tool (blog, chat, group email) that will post all important news going out to the full SFCC membership: We see the wisdom in this; but remind the community that internet reception is either unstable or not available for many of our members in the Philippines and across Africa. Perhaps a blog within the SFCC website would be a way of uniting us all in having the same source of information. It would be up to the designated person in each region to determine how often the news

should be posted. The members who subscribe to the blog would receive news immediately in their emails. Others would access the news by logging into the website.

(2) National Communication Coordinator

(NCC): We do not believe there is a need to create another international service role (NCC) for facilitating communication. The RCC does this at the local level and the ICC Team and Archives get the word out to the full membership. The RCC is always free to ask for help at the local level. This "recommendation" requires a change of structure and, necessarily, must be designated a formal Proposal.

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Roz Frampton: The multiple plans to change the structure and process of SFCC submitted by **Roz Frampton (Ruah/UK)** need clarity. We recommend that the website team and archivists be consulted for accuracy and clarity, as well as necessity because these proposals (not recommendation) call for a total redesign of the SFCC structure and process that would not be in alignment with the Profile or our Mission and Vision. Rose Miles led us in a closing prayer that

focused us on the spirit of American indigenous tradition's perspective of Earth Day.

Several members of the East Central Region met on April 28 to discuss topics and thoughts presented in the ATA. Members discussed the question offered to all regions in the December/January ATA-how do you see SFCC in the next five years? After reading the responses in the article, we discussed the vision of growth, recognition in the Church, retirement from professional activities, taking over the traditional congregations and beginning new apostolates. As a group, our vision is somewhat different. We see the growth of the community in Africa, the Philippines, and India but see it as a flowering of the vision of Lillanna. The rapid growth of SFCC in the United States in the early years

served as a bridge to a new way of living the vowed life, which we recognize as happening now in other countries. In five years, traditional congregations will be obsolete and those looking for a bridge will have found SFCC. SFCC will be the harbinger of what so called religious life will be in the future. It cannot be institutionalized and will be a loosely connected movement of women called by Christ to commit themselves totally to him. In five years, we would expect to see fewer members in the U.S. many beyond time and others at the wisdom age. Members will continue to build Christian community (in the broadest sense of the term Christian) in whatever place they are called to bear witness to simplicity, community, and love. We see that like SFCC in the 1970s, the recent growth of SFCC in other countries, most especially countries in Africa, are laboring something new into existence.

With great respect and humility, we would offer some thoughts from a group which includes a member from the earliest days of the community (Betty Waigand). We invite our new members to be in the time of transition, to let go of the need to be in control. To remember we/you are laboring something new into existence, so avoid the possibilities of returning to an old model. As we grow, let us remember to reflect on our roots. We were born in freedom, so we should be careful to protect that freedom especially as it relates to control by any patriarchal and hierarchical system. The desire to be recognized by bishops and priests begs the question how we see ourselves as Sisters For Christian Community.

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The members further discussed the request coming from the SFCC Website for a \$5000 gift from the ATA reserve fund to be used to update the website to meet increasing needs. The members present believe this is a good use of funds sitting dormant and may be instrumental in meeting the need for a better communication system expressed in several recommendations noted in the May/June ATA.

PHILIPPINES INTERREGIONAL BUSINESS MEETING

Apple Tree Hotel and Resort, April 22, 2023 Time: 2:02pm

The session was opened with a prayer led by Virgie Azcueta. The attendees from the three regions were grouped into four small circles. The meeting started with exchanges of greetings and short friendly talks. Then business was called to order.

First agenda: Wearing of uniform/habit (one color, one style/cut), This proposal was presented by Tess from the Yesu Marie Region. They were given

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ten minutes to talk about it. One group agreed to the proposal and to wearing the habit only on special occasions.

The two other groups had the same proposal, with or without the veil. After voting, the resolution was to wear a habit/uniform with the same color, cut/style, with or without the veil as needed.

Then each region's RCC updated the assembly about the situations in their areas. Calungsod Region is with 9 affirmed, with 3 inquirers and 2 who have gone to the Father. They had their Regional Assembly at Naval last Dec 2022 with a side trip to visit Erlinda.

The group was informed about her health status. They have their new RCC with Bing Gorospe. Yesu Marie reported that they have 9 affirmed, 2 affiliates and their new RCC is Flor. Meanwhile, Lorenzo Ruiz Region declared 9 affirmed, 3 affiliates. Two sisters have died and several members have chosen to respond to special callings. Cornelia Santos is recovering from stroke so she was not around during the assembly.

The region plans to improve their solidarity fund.

The next agenda is about the 2023 Kenya International Assembly which will be held on July 13 – 16, 2023. Two members from the Philippines will participate as part of the organizing committee. Virgie recalled the assembly experience in St. Louis, Missouri, wherein the sisters had "hybrid meetings". The same technology will be used in Kenya. Those who will want to join need to send \$75.00 for registration. Total for the entire virtual assembly is \$150.00. (See registration form in back)

Third agenda is the proposed hosting of the 2025 International Assembly.

Virgie and Bern suggested this in the last international assembly. Deliberation result: scheduled on July 17 - 20. 2025 with the theme: New Life, New Strength in Mission.

Fourth Agenda, The 2024 International Assembly in USA.

Next Agenda: Solidarity Fund. Each region updated the assembly about their solidarity fund, with resolutions to improve and strengthen this fund.

Sixth Agenda: Becoming Process. Meetings for the affiliates and inquirers is every second Sunday of the month. Documents will be sent to the concerned.

The service was deeply spiritual; the sharing "out of worship" filled with joy and an abundance of love for Lynn, recognizing that the day was a response to the call of the Spirit that Lynn so faithfully heeded over many years. The sisters in WEB feel privileged to have been part of Lynn's journey and welcome Lynn into full membership in SFCC.

Esther Onwunali made her vowed commitment on May 13, 2023 via a ceremony on Zoom with the sisters in the WEB Region. The readings and hymns for the service were chosen by Esther and were very meaningful as Esther renewed the vows she had made 30 years ago in her former community, the Daughters of Divine Love in Nigeria. Esther now vowed to live them according to the Profile of the Sisters for Christian Community. We are happy to welcome Esther as a member of the WEB Region.

After Esther's Commitment Service, we discussed the issues presented in the April ATA. All agreed that the website is critical to SFCC communication and that gifting \$5000 from the ATA reserve fund is INTERNATIONAL COMMUNICATION

appropriate use of the funds, that upgrading the website would be a solution to the Florida recommendation concerning better communication. In addressing the Florida recommendation, it was noted that the rationale stated, "each Region/member would accept responsibility for mentoring/informing those who might not be able to access the dedicated line". We strongly affirm the fact that communication is a regional duty and every member of the region, not just the RCC, is individually responsible for reaching out to the others, especially the elderly and sisters in nursing facilities. The RCC should be made aware of who and where these sisters are residing.

There was a mixed response to the second Florida recommendation. Many felt that it was not necessary to add another service role to our structure, that it is the responsibility of the RCCs to communicate with the ICCs. Caution is to avoid SFCC becoming a bureaucracy. On the other hand, as SFCC becomes more global, the role of ICC becomes more complex. The sisters who volunteer to fill the role of ICC accept the burden of the position while they may have a full life with ministry duties.



Sylvia Hicks is one of twelve children born and raised in Canada. She felt called to religious life since she was 12, to medicine since she was 10, and a call to work in Africa since she was 5. Sylvia departed this life on April 15, 2023, having all three dreams fulfilled.

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Sylvia served with the Sisters of the Child Jesus for 20 years, "attracted to their spirit of joy and simplicity." She earned a medical degree both as a practitioner and as an anesthesiologist, working as a doctor in the mission of Africa, Liberia, Colombia, Mexico, and across Canada, especially the Northwest Territories. Sylvia also acquired a private pilot's license; frosting on the cake of her adventurous life.

Sylvia joined SFCC in 1982 writing: "It feels so good to find others who share my vision of religious life, and who dare to be true to what they have found. Now I can be truly responsible to the Holy Spirit and to those who cross my path in whatever way. I still feel daring, but with a lot of hope in the company of my courageous sisters, as I feel the strength of truly dedicated Church Women, and am happy to start a new chapter of my life in a new way."

Dominga Mosqueda was born and raised in Mexico "immersed in a communitarian lifestyle where you shared with others your home and possessions." Her religious education was provided at home where "openness and respect toward other denominations" was cultivated throughout her formative years. In 1954, Dominga entered the Ursulines of the Roman Union where she remained for 36 years, serving as a nurse's aide, hospital chaplain, and prison chaplain. Her ministry also extended to migrant workers in Texas where she met SFCC sisters in the South Central Region, working with Nancy Brosette and Mary Ann Goudin for 10 years before being introduced to Elaine Burroughs who became her mentor in SFCC.

"I felt at home with the SFCCs," she wrote. "Their way of life reflects what Angela Merici (foundress of the Ursulines) wanted her followers to live out – work to support yourself, living alone or with one or two others. She wanted in no way for her followers to become a canonical group. She insisted vows were vows, whether public or private. What matters is the intention in the heart. I am now in God's grace with the SFCCs, focusing on a compassionate spirituality in ministry."

Dominga's sisters in the South Central Region (TX) lost touch with Dominga when her family moved her into a nursing home near them. This is the unfortunate reason we are only now hearing of her departure from this life four years ago. Even so, we remember Dominga lovingly and with gratitude for the compassionate life she loved and lived in the name of SFCC.

Lorraine Schneider, the oldest of seven children, was born and raised in Oregon. In 1941, during her junior year in high school, Lorraine entered the novitiate of the Sisters of St. Mary. She earned a degree in French from Maryhurst College in Portland, and taught French in area schools until 1972 when she left the Sisters of St. Mary to take care of her father.

From 1975-1993, Lorraine served as an Associate Pastor at St. Monica's Parish in Coos Bay Oregon. In 1977, she joined SFCC and lived in community with Lillanna Kopp until 2011, always an enthusiastic member of SFCC and active in the Pacific Northwest Region. As Associate Pastor, Lorraine's most significant contribution to the community at St. Monica's was a sacramental ministry. She found herself 19

most at home in the Parish Service Center where she was available to all who called. Besides assisting in bringing sacraments to the sick and elderly, Lorraine worked with religious education coordinators, was leader of the folk group, and officiated at funeral services. Lorraine followed the call to priesthood wherever it led.

Lorraine also distinguished herself as both imaginative and creative in teaching calligraphy. At the encouragement of her colleague and pastor, Fr. John Donin, Lorraine taught calligraphy one night a week, alternating terms between Southwestern Oregon Community College and the Coos Art Museum.

In 1993, after retirement, Lorraine moved to Seattle and became an active volunteer at St. Joseph Parish. When she felt the need for additional care, she requested entrance to St. Joseph Residence in West Seattle, where she enjoyed the opportunity to keep sharing life experiences with other religious women. She departed this life on April 12, 2023 at the age of 98. In a personal statement, written in 2009, Lorraine concluded, "The best and happiest years of my life were those I spent at St. Monica's in community with my SFCC sisters."
