


As a new ICC Team will be affirmed at the 2023 Assembly, we have been asked how did Carmen, Virgie and Denise make it work with different locations in different time zones and differing sets of commitments. So, we thought it might be important for us to share some of the practices and insight we came to.

We did a Messenger face-to-face meeting every 3 weeks for a good hour and a half with one of us preparing an agenda, which each of us could also contribute to. We also used phone, Messenger, and What's App to check in with each other. When we sent any communication out on behalf of the 3 of us, we sent it to each other before it went out, so that we were on the same page and could find anything that needed clarification. As we gathered every 3 weeks, we also had a spiritual sharing and concluded with a simple prayer. It was important that we listened to each other respectfully, even when we held differing perspectives on a topic or issue, so we could understand each other's perspective.

We also met in person every year...even during the pandemic, for 3 days, to look back and to look forward on the coming year and the needs of the community. We were blessed to be able to do this in person at a retreat house on the East Coast. At the beginning of our term, we divided the responsibilities and also geographic areas to be in contact with. When we gathered, we re-evaluated these to see if we needed to change anything, or if there was something which was not getting adequate attention.

As a community, we are truly standing on the shoulders of those who have gone before us and now from beyond time, continue to empower us by their example and intercession that all may be one.

ANDREA GAVIN (JANE)

LIFE: 1933-2023

SFCC: 2005-2023

One of the pupils she taught at that time, described her as an excellent teacher and a lovely, very gentle person.

Andrea was born in Glasgow, Scotland, where her parents had a newsagents shop. She was one of three children.

She was educated by the Sisters of Mercy and went on to train as a teacher with the Sacred Heart Sisters in Edinburgh. Having qualified, she returned to Glasgow where she taught in a primary school for several years. One of the pupils she taught at that time, described her as an excellent teacher and a lovely, very gentle person.

In 1962, she left Glasgow and entered with the Sisters of Mercy in Sunderland, England. During her time in Sunderland, she taught at a large primary school in the city, where eventually she became the principal. She was highly respected and well-liked by both staff and pupils and made many good friends who kept in touch with her right up to her death.

Andrea became interested in Counselling and having retired from teaching, and with the permission of her community, she returned to Glasgow in order to study at Sterling University, from where she gained a Master's Degree in Counselling. She began working towards her Doctorate but because of health issues, she was unable to complete this. She was also a trained reflexologist.

When, in 2003, her Mercy Community in Sunderland asked her to return there, she made the big decision to leave them. Having contacted Mary Paul Gilroy, whom she knew from the past, she began attending SFCC meetings and having followed the Becoming Process, she was affirmed into SFCC in December 2005. Andrea attended one International Assembly - San Antonio in 2006.

Following her commitment, Andrea lived alone in an apartment in Glasgow and continued her studies, alongside working as a trainer of counsellors at the nearby university. As her health deteriorated, she was unable to travel to Regional Meetings

but the SFCCs from the North East of England kept in touch and visited as often as possible.

In the autumn of 2019, because of increasing dementia, Andrea reluctantly moved to Nazareth House Residential Care Home in Glasgow where she died on New Year's Day 2023. The last few years have been difficult for Andrea but thankfully, she is now at peace with the God she served so faithfully.

AGNES M. HAGEN

LIFE: 1938-2022 SFCC: 1976-2022

Agnes spent her vowed life dedicated to bringing to those she served just what they needed...

Agnes was born in Albany, NY on June 14, 1938, and was given the name Mary. She was the only child of Terrence and Julia Hagen to survive birth. After 12 years of education at the Academy of the Holy Names in Albany, Mary entered the novitiate of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, in Rome, NY, where she received the name Sr. Agnes Mary. In 1974, Agnes took this as her legal name.

From 1958-1972, Agnes taught first graders. Her teaching career took her to Albany, NY, Fall River, MA, Syracuse, NY, Washington, DC, and St. Petersburg, FL. During these years, she earned her B.A. in English from

Medaille College in Buffalo NY, and her M.Ed. from the University of VA.

One of Agnes' hobbies was writing, and this skill came in handy when she sought to clarify her stand on the issue of religious community. The March, 1973 issue of Review for Religious carried her article entitled "Religious Community after Vatican II." She also wrote a series of articles for "The Evangelist" to help the laity in Albany, NY, understand the recent changes in religious life.

In 1972, Agnes moved to Silver Spring, MD, and became associated with the Archdiocesan Office of Education in Washington, DC where she served as a reading specialist and specialist-consultant, and volunteered her services in adult literacy programs.

Agnes joined the SFCCs in 1976 as a dual member. This dual Membership ceased in 1991 when Agnes officially left the SNJM Community. Sisters who knew her during these years described her as "a very social, fun-loving and energetic person, and deeply committed to SFCC," as "a joyful spirit in love with God and radiating that presence," and as "a real saint in our midst to encourage and inspire us." Her deep commitment to social justice became evident after she joined SFCC, and was free to begin the next phase of her religious commitment.

In 1976, Agnes, armed with a real estate license in Baltimore, went to work in the inner-city with the Jesuits at St. Ambrose Housing Aid Center, where she worked finding and facilitating the selling of affordable homes to the poor. In 1983, Agnes returned to teaching, but this time she taught young at-risk adults enrolled in Job Corps. When the Center closed three years

later, Agnes moved to Staunton, Virginia to teach for the Virginia Department of Correctional Education.

While teaching at the Men's Prison in Staunton, Agnes wrote eight books for the men she was teaching who were remedial readers. Four of these books were westerns and four were mysteries. The Westerns won an award from the Public Library Association. When the Prison closed in 2002, Agnes retired, but she continued to serve her local community, even taking on leadership positions in groups seeking to effect change on the local level.

Agnes became a member of the Sunbelt Region when she moved to Staunton, but she also participated in many of the meetings of the WEB Region. Agnes was adventurous, and one of her favorite hobbies was kayaking. She loved to travel. She would drive in her white truck to the Sunbelt Region meetings, or just up into the Blue Ridge Mountains to enjoy a day of rest and relaxation. She travelled to Ireland, Italy and Switzerland.

Agnes enjoyed attending the SFCC Community Assemblies and making friends. For the local SFCC group in Central Virginia, Agnes would take her turn hosting meetings in her little house in Staunton. She had a wonderful sense of humor, and loved to celebrate special occasions. Throughout her years in Virginia, Agnes took part in the Spiritual Development Seminars taught by Msgr. Chester Michael, and she credited these seminars with nourishing her deep life of prayer.

After her retirement in 2003, Agnes identified "Contemplative Outreach," as her new area of ministry. By this time, she had become very active in the Centering Prayer Movement, sharing her spiritual wisdom with the Centering Prayer Groups she led in

Staunton. VA. She continued doing this until 2010 when her health became seriously affected, by what doctors later identified as a stroke.

From June 10, 2010 to October 31, 2022 (the day she died), Agnes was on the last and final phase of her earthly journey, a journey of surrendering her involvement in everything she had known and loved. She had given up her home in Staunton, VA, the mountains she loved, the activities she enjoyed, and her independence, to a life of total dependence and continuing memory loss.

In 2012, Agnes was moved from Staunton, VA, to an assisted living facility in Richmond, VA, to be closer to her local SFCC Community, and, while she knew she was deeply loved and cared for, she had given up "everything." Her strength for this final journey came from the God to whom she had totally dedicated her life, first, as a teenager in the SNJM Community, and then as a mature adult, in the SFCC Community. Strength also came from the friendships she had forged throughout her life, and finally, and most importantly, it came from her deep prayer relationship with God, the One who, she knew, loved her unconditionally.

Agnes spent her vowed life dedicated to bringing to those she served just what they needed – spiritual formation, educational skills, decent and affordable housing, a sense of worthwhileness to the imprisoned, friendship to co-workers and parishioners in Staunton and Waynesboro, and a true gift of sisterhood to those in her SFCC Community. We have known a religious woman who taught us by her lived life to give the credit for all good to God. Thank you, Agnes.

DOROTHY E. LAUBERTH

LIFE: 1932-2022 SFCC: 1983—2022

Dorothy was a prayer warrior and made a habit of visiting and taking communion to whomever was in need.

Sister Dorothy E. Lauberth, 90, of Sullivan, Mo., passed away peacefully Sunday, December 18, 2022 at her home.

Sister Dorothy Elizabeth was born on February 28, 1932 in Freeburg, Mo., to Joseph Henry and Mary (Eisterhold) Lauberth. She grew up and attended school in the Freeburg area before graduating and moving to St. Louis. She worked several years in St. Louis before entering The Sisters of St. Mary's Community. Sister Dorothy was a member of the community for over 25 years. During this time, she continued her education and earned a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing. Sister Dorothy spent much of her career as a nurse, not only ministering as a nurse in many states but also in several Missouri penitentiaries. In 1983, she entered the Sisters for Christian Community, Midwest Region, where she remained until her passing.

Sister Dorothy, is remembered as a faithfilled woman, loved cooking, baking (especially sugar cookies), making new friends and spending time with those she loved. She was a prayer warrior and made a habit of visiting and taking communion to whomever was in need. She also loved her dog, Bandit. Sister Linda, a companion for 45 years and Sister Joann, a companion for 22 years, were sisters in community as well as special friends. Sister Dorothy donated her body to St. Louis University's School of Medicine for medical research. We are forever grateful for her unselfishness and the most charitable gift to support medical education and research.

The last day of the year, December 31, 2022, was reserved for the Memorial Mass for Sister Dorothy at St. Anthony Parish, in Sullivan. Missouri. Our small SFCC community have been members there since 2007, It was celebrated with much joy, admiration, and love. Those celebrating the Mass were a combination of our three families (Lauberth, Cox, and Kuchler), plus three of our Sisters: (Cecelia Ann Loomer, Mary Ann Wachtel, and Colleen Calhoun).

Parishioners and many friends, joined in the wonderful celebration of Life, which was followed by a full luncheon, prepared by the women of the parish.

Dorothy remains an angel at the side of all who knew and loved her, especially the SFCC sisterhood who stand upon her shoulders.

NIEVES P. ROBILLOS

LIFE 1936 - 2023 SFCC 2002 - 2023

It was on a hilltop that she built a prayer and retreat house for those who can't afford to pay for spiritual retreats, adding a dorm and an office for SFCCs passing by Cebu.

Nieves P. Robillos passed on to eternal life on January 9th, the start of Cebu's weeklong *Sinulog* or the Feast of Santo Niño, kindling memories of her endearing childlike qualities.

When limbs were limber, Nieves prayed through dancing and singing, joining the multitudes that celebrate and honor the Holy Child Jesus yearly. She delighted in singing and dancing with the late Helen Fernandez at SFCC Philippines inter-regionals.

She was a happy and gentle person, the serene smile and twinkling eyes undimmed by old age and strife. And how she loved children, teaching them in elementary, high school and college in the Philippines and in Thailand, guided by childlike faith.

As *Sinulog* is a family and community celebration, Nieves knew that children are nurtured in the family and becoming adults, nurtured in an expanded family called community, always interdependent on each other.

Trusting to the point of naivete, she became a builder of communities, with courage in trying uncharted waters and starting again at her beginnings after a failure.

She retained her childlike humility and lack of pretension despite coming from a landed and illustrious clan. Her father, Pio Robillos, was an Asian and national champion sprinter who became a professor in Cebu. He and his wife, Filomena Pastrano, raised a brood of two daughters and two sons. Nieves was the younger daughter.

She joined the Sisters of Saint Paul of Chartres in 1959, but left to spend more time with her ill father.

When the Marian Contemplative Community that she was trying to organize in Bukidnon didn't pan out, she tried forming the Marian Missionary Society of the Philippines. She almost got killed in reaching out to a drug dependent.

Nieves formed the Golden Heart Foundation in Cebu City with daily feeding for up to 20 people, livelihood projects, social services and other activities despite funding lack.

It was on a hilltop that she built a prayer and retreat house for those who can't afford to pay for spiritual retreats, adding a dorm and an office for SFCCs passing by Cebu. There she spent her last years, plagued by ill health till she succumbed to pneumonia.

Having formed a close bond with Nieves when they were both based in Dumaguete, Jess Ayeng remembers her friend as "very gentle, calm, sweet" and "very holy".

Bohol-based Jess continued making time for her friend in Cebu, stopping for her and holding her hand. She visited Nieves on her 87th birthday on May 18 last year. The Robillos' domestic helper Rosa, along with her own family, moved in with Nieves to keep her company and take good care of her. They moved her to the safety of the adjacent dorm when her house was destroyed by super typhoon Rae in December 2021.

This final community that Nieves built out of kindness for the marginalized responded in kind till she breathed her last.

Josephine Sinack, an active member of the Great Lakes Region throughout her life in SFCC, departed this life on New Year's Eve, December 31, 2022, at 90 years of age. Gifted as she also was as an organist and choir director, Josephine's interests were, in her words, "varied and many,: including "art work, stitchery, needlepoint, and sewing," along with travel, which she did "extensively" in the Middle East, Europe, Ireland, Canada, and throughout the U.S. In professing vows of sisterhood with SFCC, she said, "I wish to be of service in Christian Community."

Wish granted for Josephine, SFCC, and all whose lives were touched by hers. We remember Josephine in gratitude for all the joy she brought into this world, and the everlasting love her life gives to SFCC. Blessed Be Josephine Sinack



The sisters from Virginia related the details of Agnes Hagan's death, funeral service and burial, of Agnes' publications and prison ministry. Pat McCarthy and Anne McGinn had provided loving care and attention to Agnes for the past ten years.

On Saturday, January 14, 2023, twenty-one members of WEB (18 sisters and 3 affiliates) gathered for the monthly Zoom meeting. After prayer welcoming the New Year, there was clarification concerning virtual attendance at the Assembly and an update on names to be submitted for the service role of ICC in the February ATA. The question again was raised about the \$150 fee for virtual participants. Notable in the 2022 Assembly was the absence of sisters from the developing countries who did not join virtually; \$150 U.S. dollars is more that most can spare. It is important that Mary Rose submit a report to the community of expenses incurred in purchasing

equipment for the assemblies. Is there another way this could be funded?

We spent some time discussing the question raised in the December ATA: How do we see SFCC in the next five years? Membership in SFCC has shifted from the Eurocentric hemisphere to the eastern hemisphere and we need to be respectful of those cultures, and the Church as it is present there. As traditional religious communities decline, SFCC is providing a bridge to the future of religious life there as it did in the 1970s in the U.S. Most of our new members, regardless of region, are native to the African continent. It is important that they be represented in service roles.

Thinking of the rapid advances in technology, what will communication in SFCC look like in five years? The dream is that our central system will be virtual, utilizing what is then available to accommodate the global membership. Who will provide the expertise and how will it be funded?

Another concern raised is the possibility of SFCC adopting a critical global issue of the day and speaking as one voice to support change instead of focusing, as has been our history, on internal problems. But it was mentioned that, as individuals, we can each tap into resources available and make a difference by our personal involvement.



Before closing, there was some discussion of how the discernment process among the ICC nominees might be effected in a hybrid assembly.

Our next Zoom will be on Saturday, February 11, 2023.
