

WELCOME to the SFCC International Assembly 2026-Manila, Philippines



The final Registration Form with edition is in this issue of ATA Feb. March. Accommodations are in Friendship Hall 1 and Friendship Hall 2. Prices are shared depending how many are staying in a room. Friendship Hall 1 has twin beds, aircon, toilet, hot shower. Friendship Hall 2 has twin/full beds, aircon, toilet, hot shower, TV phone. Note this details as you book your accommodation.

Registration at the front lobby will start on January 13 at 3:00 pm. Assembly Schedule begins on January 14, 2026. Payments must be done in Philippine pesos. Please try to arrive by Jan 13th. Earlier arrivals have to purchase their meals at the Pius XII cafeteria or along the United Nation Street and a Mall where fast food is available.

Catering paid with your registration will start with breakfast from 14th Jan-until Jan 18th breakfast.

Those who will stay longer in Pius XII can take care of their own meals similar for early arrivals. You are free to omit snacks deduct in your meal payments. Distilled water dispenser for drinking will be provided at the meeting hall and in the corridor of Friendship Hall 1 and 2.

We begin with prayer offered by a different person each time and are blessed by the variety and depth. We continue with sharing about our spiritualities with a prompt such as 'how have we experienced God's presence or guidance. We looked at what would be the focus for each of us in 2025. We shared about what we saw would be important for the community for 2025 such as a deeper awareness of the gift of international growth and the challenges which this also brings in empowering "That all may be one".

The **Midwest Region** met on October 19 at the Sarah Community in Saint Louis. Present were Darlene Boyd, Colleen Calhoun, Cecelia Ann Loomer, Laurinda Mayer, and Mary Ann Wachtel. Those unable to attend were Joann Kuchler, Joann Mazzocchio, Elizabeth Miller and Pearl Johnson. The opening prayer was focused on Carol Baltosiewich, who died on September 18 at the Benedictine Nursing Center at Our Lady of the Snows Shrine in Belleville, Illinois. After our prayer we shared memories of Carol. There were some surprises found among her effects. Carol was a talented nurse. She eventually burned-out working at a busy hospital in Wisconsin. She saw a listing for a homecare nursing in Illinois, applied and got the job. She grew tired of caregiving in the rural area and broke ground in the 1980s by opening an organization to provide services for people living with HIV and AIDS. Though she was a trained ICU and ER nurse, Sister Carol had much to learn. She saw an opportunity, and with another sister to volunteer at Catholic hospitals in Kansas City, Chicago and New York City on the front lines of the AIDS crisis. After this immersive experience, Sister Carol returned to Belleville and got to work. She set up a helpline to answer questions about HIV and AIDS, which turned into a highly respected AIDS service organization known as "Bethany Place".

That experience dramatically changed Sister Carol's perspective. She witnessed firsthand the suffering people with AIDS experienced, along with their partners and family members. But it was the deep love present amidst the suffering that profoundly changed her. She

would come to realize that ministering to people with HIV and AIDS first required a sincere self-examination. As she put it, "You can't even deal with AIDS until you first face your own prejudices and biases."

Michael O'Loughlin, a journalist, contacted Carol in 2016, for her story which is featured in a book, Hidden Mercy (2021). Loughlin wrote that conducting interviews for his book had a "profound effect" on his faith, so much so that he wrote a letter to Pope Francis to tell him about the book and the conversations he had. In August, the pope wrote back. The letter was written in Spanish but was translated to English, "Thank you for shining a light on the lives and bearing witness to the many priests, religious sisters and lay people, who opted to accompany, support and help their brothers and sisters who were sick from HIV and AIDS at great risk to their profession and reputation," Pope Francis wrote. He added, "Instead of indifference, alienation and even condemnation, these people let themselves be moved by the mercy of the Father and allowed that to become their own life's work; a discreet mercy, silent and hidden, but still capable of sustaining and restoring the life and history of each one of us."

We attended the funeral Liturgy for Carol with the Sarah Community. In the afternoon we talked about having our funeral arrangements available in the Region. We also reflected on Rita Yeasted's beautiful Assembly Presentation. We recommend that our Profile (Who We Are) be updated to read: We are Christian women 'living in a new pattern of the consecrated life in a prophetic ecclesial' community. We were all energized by Ritamary Bradley's vision 25 years ago! We set our spring date and closed our meeting by praying with Shaina Taub's, "Keep Marching."

Gloria and Rose undertook sexual health and addiction rehabilitation training, and Sisters Rose, Gloria, and Lucy received training in nonviolent communication (NVC). We are especially grateful to Sister Lilian for her support and help in securing the scholarship for the NVC training.

Our regional gathering with the theme, "Embracing People as Human," was held in Otukpo from December 10th to 16th, 2024. Our

reflections and sharing helped us develop a greater appreciation for the dignity and uniqueness of every individual as created in God's image. This fosters a culture of love, acceptance, and compassion that reflects God's character, as stated in Genesis 1:26-27 and Psalm 139:13-14.

Sister Lucy gave a talk on nonviolent communication, emphasizing observation, feelings, needs, and requests.

Observation - Communicating what we see and hear without judgment.

Feelings - Connecting emotionally with others to build understanding.

Needs - Identifying what we value and need to feel satisfied.

Requests - Communicating our needs to others in a non-threatening manner. She emphasized that valuing community through communication





fosters a sacred bond built on respect, understanding, acceptance, appreciation, and compassion. Those who embody these five essential pillars can practice nonviolence effortlessly each day. Continuing on nonviolence, Sr. Gloria guided us in reflecting on the consequences of violent behaviors on others while highlighting the need to respect individual rights.

During our gathering, we welcome Bridget Mbanan Ugboho who made her Covenant of Affiliation commitment. After our gathering, we visited Bishop Michael E. Apochi of Otukpo, where we had convened. He was pleased by our presence in his diocese. The Bishop invited us to

dinner at the Bishop's House and surprised us with a light celebration to mark the occasion and the birthday milestones of Sisters Rose and Gloria (who turned 40)

Afterward, due to a miscommunication, Florence left the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception and moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin where she attended J.J. Johnson CAN (Certified Nursing Assistance) to be a Medical Assistant. After completing her courses, Florence worked at Froedtert Hospital from 2022 to 2023. Presently, Florence works with the Department of Corrections so that she can transfer to the medical department as a Medical Assistant. Since the beginning as an Inquirer in March of 2024, Florence has expressed her new felt sense of freedom and joy and she is looking forward to continuing the SFCC expression of Religious Life.

Obituary



Carmelita Theresa Stinn Obituary April 28, 1928 -December 19, 2024

Carmelita Theresa Stinn, 96, of Hattiesburg, MS, passed away on Thursday, December 19, 2024. Carmelita was born on

Saturday, April 28, 1928, in Neola, Iowa, to Edward and Bertha (Kronfuss) Stinn. . Bertha loved the name Carmelita and was told her name was too complicated for young children to pronounce, Carmelita's two-year-old brother, Edward, proved otherwise, confidently declaring "Carmelita." Later, at her confirmation, she added the names Theresa and Isabel, embracing her full identity with pride. Carmelita loved her family deeply, sharing tender moments such as eating pie with her mother while preparing dinner and teaching her younger sister, Angela, the

rosary bead prayer: "A little pair of rosary beads, as plain as plain can be, but only God in heaven knows how dear they are to me." Carmelita graduated high school in 1946 from St. Joseph Academy in Des Moines, Iowa. She worked at an orphanage, as a nurse's aide at a hospital, at Life magazine, and Pastime Club, all in Des Moines.

Carmelita was engaged to Frank West. However, she felt a sacred calling and returned the ring to Frank, remaining friends with him and his family throughout her life.

In 1949, Carmelita followed her holy vocation to serve God and His people as a nun, joining the order of the Holy Spirit Missionaries based in Techny, IL. She took the name Sister Edwardine after both her father and late brother. Sister Carmelita was known to leave the convent to minister to inmates at a state penitentiary; rumor has it that she advocated to the governor for better living conditions for them. Throughout her life, she had a sweet tooth, and shared stories of her intense dislike of the prune soup at the convent. Nieces and nephews remember "Aunt Carm" buying them ice cream from the Good Humor Man when they came to visit. In 1952, she was sent by the order to teach at Magnolia State in Mississippi, as well as in Pine Bluff, AR, Meridian, MS, Greenville, MS, and finally to Northbrook, IL, where she taught second through fifth grade for 17 years.

Carmelita joined the Sisters for Christian

Community in 1975, which allowed her the freedom she desired in serving outside the convent environment and in the broader community, furthering her pursuit of helping others. She returned to her birth name, becoming Sister Carmelita Stinn. Sister Carmelita once said, "I was so happy I said I would come back, and that's where I am. I guess it was my first love. I've liked every place I've been, but there was something about Mississippi." Sister Carmelita settled in Hattiesburg, MS, first living in a small apartment appropriately located on Agape Avenue (agape meaning sacrificial love). She later purchased her current home. Carmelita received her Masters in Social Work at the University of Southern Mississippi in 1977.

Sister Carmelita was adjunct faculty member of USM. She was a member of: National Association of Christan Workers, American

Association for Mental Deficiencies, National Association for Social Workers, And the Mississippi Conference of Social Welfare. She was also a board member of: Right to Succeed (Mental Retardation), Foster Care Review Board, Governing board Royal Maid Association of the Blind, and the Forrest County Association for Retarded Citizens.

Her practicum was at Ellisville State School in Ellisville, MS, where she remained as a regional case manager for 17 years. She was invested in establishing and organizing community-based apartments and group homes for many of her clients until her retirement in 1993.

After retirement, Sister Carmelita became even busier. Carmelita loved the community of Hattiesburg selflessly, especially the Hispanic community. Throughout her life, she was known for serving, modeling to those around her how to be like Jesus. Sister had a gift for finding a friend in others, regardless of whether they were wealthy or poor. She even had a baby named after her, Carmelita Hernandez. In 2010, she founded St. Thomas Aquinas Parish's Social Services Ministry, supporting those in need throughout the Hattiesburg area. Bags of donated items were often left on Sister Carmelita's doorstep for her to distribute to families around the city. Every Christmas, she would wrap presents to give to those she served. Other times, when she was out of food to distribute, she was known to "borrow" leftover food from the church. Even after her



stroke, Carmelita continued to get rides into every area of town, making deliveries to families. Sister Carmelita faithfully served God's Kingdom in sisterhood for over 75 years.

In 2011, Sister Carmelita received the Distinguished Alumna Award from the University of Southern Mississippi. Sister Carmelita also received the Hattiesburg Lions Club Citizen of the Year Award, the National Association of Social Workers Mississippi Chapter's Lifetime Achievement Award, The Southern Miss Social Work Pioneer Award (2010), and the Welcome Mat Award for her volunteer work with Habitat for Humanity (2009).

Having a way of connecting to the hearts of children, Sister Carmelita would often run and play with them, described by the kids as "lightning fast." She enjoyed jogging and speedwalking into her 80s on the University of Southern Mississippi's gorgeous grounds. Many people who joined her in this endeavor had a hard time keeping up with her pace. She always lived her life on the go; few could keep up with her boundless energy. Carmelita had a great sense of humor, her laugh was contagious and will always be remembered. She loved to play Scrabble and was quite competitive. Sister Carmelita enjoyed spending time with her many siblings, nieces, and nephews. She viewed her family as her special blessing from the Lord.

Sister Carmelita Stinn touched numerous lives and was loved by many. She is survived by her sister, Angela Jacobs of Waverly, Iowa; brother, Dennis (Margaret) Stinn of Fort Collins, CO; brother-in-law, Phillip Duggan of Spring, TX; sister-in-law, Lynda Stinn of Santa Maria, CA;

many nieces and nephews, and dear friends throughout the years. She was preceded in death by her parents, Edward and Bertha; sisters Hedy (Mac) McQuade, Marita Duggan, and Joan (Marvin) Nehring; brothers Vernon (Frieda), Edward, and Gerald Stinn; nieces Theresa Davis, Catherine Spillers, and Theresa Foss; brother-inlaw Earl Jacobs; nephew Craig Jacobs; great nephew Zachariah Langford.

In the countless letters she wrote, she always added, "Pray for me, I'm praying for you."

"His lord said to him: Well done, good and faithful servant, because thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will place thee over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord." Matthew 25:21

Thank you to Kathy Loftin and those that cared for Sister Carmelita. Sister loved and viewed you as family. You honored her wishes to be in her own home and cared for in dignity and love. Thank you to the many great friends and family who prayed for, supported, and loved Sister Carmelita throughout her life, and to the Hattiesburg community, who Sister Carmelita faithfully loved and served alongside.
